Stormy Times

As I write it is mid-June and the Family Project has started preparing for the Messy Church in July. With our Messy Family we are exploring the story of Jesus calming the storm. This seemed rather apt as we are still in the midst of Covid-19 pandemic. The Government has indicated restrictions will begin to ease further soon, but for many of us it has felt, at times, as though we are in a never-ending, unmanageable storm.

As a child I always found the concept of Jesus managing to sleep through this storm fascinating. I would often watch the sky change from my bedroom window, or downstairs with my parents and simply wonder at the loudness of it all. You can see why the idea of Jesus sleeping through a storm still seems somewhat impossible to me. I suspect though Jesus slept because he was simply exhausted. Many of us may be able to relate to that bone-tired feeling. When I speak to friends now, particularly those with children, they speak of a deep tiredness that is not their norm. At the start of the story, we hear that Jesus was leaving a crowd behind when he boarded the boat. He had been spending time teaching them but also being with them, listening to them, perhaps soaking in the emotions of many different people. It makes sense why he was so tired and why he asked the disciples to accompany him on the boat, away from the crowd, to the other side of the water. The human need to escape and rest were present in Jesus.

Yet I still struggle to understand how he slept so soundly. His sleep was deep enough that the disciples had to wake him during the storm. Filled with fear they said 'Teacher, don't you care if we drown?'. These disciples were fishermen and used to storms. They may even have seen one was brewing. Yet this storm made them so scared they were fearful for their life. Jesus' response at this point is bemusing. He does not immediately address the disciples. Instead he turns to the winds and the waves; the nature that has brought so much fear

and says 'Quiet! Be still!'. The winds and waves calm down immediately. The fact Jesus has authority over nature must have been incredible to witness. I find it compelling that he turns first to the centre of the storm and communicates with it directly. Something about that statement gives me hope. Even if Jesus does not calm our current storms, the knowledge that he can communicate with and be present with us through a storm is important for me. I also find it moving to ponder how Jesus asked the disciples to go to the other side of the lake. He chose to enter a storm.

Next he turns to the disciples and says: 'Why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?'. I always wish I could determine the tone of these questions. Were they said in despair or with a caring tone? We will never know. It may well have been a mixture of the two. At first these questions seem harsh. The disciples had been deeply unsettled by the storm; their fear is a human response. Yet, Jesus' questions seem to have been rhetorical. He wanted to make them pause and think. Jesus recognised storms can be terrifying but they can also change us and shape us in new ways. Storms can give us different perspectives. Storms can lead us to faith. I wonder if during the time of lockdown you found yourself changing. How do you think differently than before? What is newly important to you? I hope most of all you feel that Jesus, or at least the sense of peace he caused to the wind and waves, is with you in whatever storm you are entering, enduring or exiting. *Lo!*

The Church in and around Kirkby Lonsdale

Eleven churches comprising Anglican, Methodist and Roman Catholic congregations, committed to growing as disciples and serving our communities together.

Although our buildings have been closed, the church (as in people) have been very active, for example in moving worship online see kl.church. It has been great to see the creativity and willingness to adapt. Care and concern for our communities has continued in the work of the community hubs and volunteering and providing pastoral care and support. We have been committed to pray consistently for our communities and especially for those who are sick or bereaved.

Private Prayer

The government has now given permission for churches to open once again for 'private prayer' where they feel they can do this safely. We are working through the implications and sourcing the necessary hygiene supplies. Some of our churches will open as soon as possible and hope that this will be on Monday 29th June. All our churches are looking forward to opening for worship as soon as Government advice allows and appropriate arrangements can be put in place.

Initially we are looking at opening St Mary's from 10am – 12am on weekdays and we plan to have stewards available. We are hoping that the other Anglican churches in the Rainbow will be open during the day as they normally are (Barbon, Casterton, Lupton, Mansergh and Middleton). The Methodist churches are not generally used by people for private prayer midweek and we would invite people to use St Mary's for individual prayer if desired.

The next step will be opening for worship in all of the churches including our local Anglican and Methodist churches and St Joseph's church but we have no details from the government or the church bodies about how and when this will happen. We do ask that anyone entering our churches for private prayer or reflection observe good hand hygiene and social distancing, particularly ensuring they give others space. We plan to provide hand sanitiser in each of the churches for use on the way in and the way out. We also ask that everyone remain in the identified areas and do not go into other parts of the church. There will be no toilets available in any church during this interim period.

Group bookings

The Methodist churches in Kirkby Lonsdale and Cowan Bridge are considering the procedures necessary to prepare and manage the buildings for our regular community groups to use. The timing of this will depend on the type of activity and also when the Government and the Methodist Church changes the advice. We look forward to welcoming our groups back as soon as we can.

Please bear with us as we work through these steps and we ask for your support and understanding.



'I work in retail and my company says it's starting to look at how we might reopen later in the summer. This is

making me very anxious, even though I don't have any special health issues. I'm going to wear a mask, but not all the customers may do so. I used to take the bus to work, I don't have a car and I think it's too far to cycle. And I'm not even sure if my kids will be back at school by then! The thought of returning to work is keeping me awake at night. Do I have to go back?'

The short answer to your question is yes, you do need to comply with any reasonable management request to return to work. However, the important issue is 'reasonable'. The government has published specific guidance for different businesses on the steps they can take to minimise coronavirus transmission. If you don't think your company is complying, or is putting your health at risk, you should talk to them about this.

Similarly, they should listen to your concerns about using public transport. You could, for instance, ask to travel at a quieter time of day. And the government has said that

if you're unable to work because of childcare issues your employer can continue to furlough you.

We would suggest approaching this as a problem that you and your boss can solve together. But if you do get a bad reaction, you could report your employer to the Health and Safety Executive. Contact South Lakes Citizens Advice for advice about your legal rights in this situation.

As I write this, the country is slowly beginning to come out of lockdown. This has been a truly terrible time for everyone, my thoughts are with everyone who has lost someone due to Coronavirus.

The mental wellbeing of people has been tested throughout and I welcome that people are now being able to cautiously socialise more in groups outside, as well as single adult households being able to form a 'support bubble'. These are all positive steps, but it is so important that we remain vigilant; that we continue to wash our hands and maintain social distancing so that we prevent a second wave of the virus. We need to get the economy going again and need provisions to enable all sectors to reopen, including hospitality and tourism which is such a huge employer in our area.

Several people have struggled to report lockdown breaches to the police through the 101 phone system. I have to admit I have had similar problems with 101 and I intend to take the matter up with Peter McCall the Cumbria Police and Crime Commissioner. I've found the 101 email system is better; I reported an incident at 10pm one evening and had a response within 20 minutes. When you report a crime, you will receive a crime reference number. If you contact me, I'm more than happy to chase this up with the PCSO, PC, Sergeant or Inspector for the area.

Please report problems on roads and pavements via Cumbria County Council's website. You can report faulty streetlights, potholes, damaged manhole covers, overgrown hedges, missing road markings and so on. It is so important that we feed as much information as possible into the system. While in lockdown I have reported several issues and the majority of works have now been undertaken. If you're unsure how to report a problem please contact me, I'm happy to help.

As you read this we are halfway through the works on Millthorpe bridge. I'm delighted that, working with Cllr Nick Cotton, the works have been moved to this summer. The works were originally scheduled for the summer of 2021. It is testament to Cumbria County Council and the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority, that they have worked hard together to get the planning permissions and worked quickly to complete the tender process.

View from the Bridge

Headline news in the Gazette: youths jumping off the bridge and damage done to the picnic tables and litter. The jumpers were advised of the dangers, especially as the river is very low, only to be thanked by a mouthful of abuse. The majority of visitors to our town do respect it and appreciate Kirkby's beauty and tranquillity. Then we have that small minority that have no appreciation of the facilities we offer or for law enforcement – and it is not just Kirkby. Thank you to all who spent time picking up the litter.

We have had a further easing of restrictions allowing more of our shops to open. It is challenging for some, as social distancing is quite difficult, so as with Borders and other small premises, selling at the door will be the norm for a while longer.

Work is continuing on the Lunesdale Hall roof. Loose slates have been refitted and the lead replaced in the valley; the work done to date seems to have cured the leaks. Repairs are also being carried out to the entrance porch roof and guttering. Prior to the shut down we had the heating system overhauled, which involved flushing it out and adding an inhibitor and a magna clean filter which should reduce the build-up of hydrogen (common in older systems of this type). Each of the fan convectors has had a thorough clean. Once the heating season starts, we should see a faster heating-up times and hopefully reduced running costs.

The council is hoping to hold its July meeting in the main hall subject to the restrictions being lifted to allow us to gather with limited numbers. If this is not possible then it is proposed to go on-line using Zoom. Members of the public would be able to view proceedings but not take part and it would be a very limited agenda. We will publicise details giving the 7 days' notice.

I would like to thank my Deputy Chairman for his help over the past few weeks whilst my daughter has been in hospital. I am pleased to say that she is now at home in Boston Lincs and I am waiting to be able to visit.

Hopefully in the next AKL I should have more to report on the outstanding projects that have been delayed.

June's 100 club winning numbers are 99, 156 and 45; the cheques have been sent.

Finally thank you to my minders and my council colleagues, not forgetting 'My Diane' sung by? Please stay safe make the most of the summer.

KLRUFC—A Brief History

Rugby in Kirkby Lonsdale began in the season 1877-78. Heversham School – now Dallam – won at Underley Park in the early winter but the Westmorland Gazette recorded a win for Kirkby Lonsdale at Heversham 23 Mar 1878. Sadly, the club's old records were lost during WWII, having been placed for safe keeping in a cupboard in the secretary's aunt's house. He returned in 1945 to find both cupboard and contents had disappeared. Our local Grammar School had, by 1879, started playing rugby and travelled to play Windermere College on 1st November of that year. It was reported that during the match, which the college won, that 'by steady dribbling the College forwards forced the ball to the enemy's goal line'. A rather different style of play in those days.

The game flourished in the late 1800s and there were over twenty clubs until the trauma of the split and the formation of the Northern Union which led to the founding of the Rugby League. In addition to the main clubs – Kendal Hornets, Kendal Town, Windermere Ambleside and Kirkby Lonsdale – there were at least 20 more clubs in South Westmorland. It is interesting to note that the club teams which still survive are those with a rugby-playing school close by. We are pleased that here in Kirkby we have a strong connection with QES and are glad to make our facilities available for them to use and for their young players to join the club.

In 1890 two Kirkby players, J K Robinson and E Richardson, were picked to play for Westmorland and thus the RFU became aware of our existence. Around the turn of the century changing facilities were to be found at one of the local inns with a cheering walk past St. Mary's and through the graveyard to Underley Park. Following the 1914-18 war rugby restarted. Kirkby was regularly represented in the county side of Cumberland and Westmorland by Billy Walling who was capped 47 times including the 1923-24 County Championship winning side.

Our grandstand was built about this time and has served generations of spectators and courting couples so well. The 20s and 30s brought the advent of motor coach travel and our fixture list expanded to take us to Lancashire and Yorkshire clubs. Many years ago, an ex-President assured us that Kirkby beat Orrell away with thirteen men! The Second World War took seven years out of a fine young team, but the club revived its activities in September 1946 with a match with Thornton Cleveleys. Season 1947-48 saw one of the finest of Kirkby sides, almost unbeaten until the snow halted games until almost Easter. In November, Kirkby beat Ambleside at home with Pickernell scoring ten tries. He had already attracted the attention of a Barrow Rugby League scout who was at the match. He signed soon after and Kirkby lost a fine player.

Next month will bring us up to date and tell of the remarkable growth of the club and its more recent achievements. *James Thompson*

Working together

Following the changes in lockdown restrictions the CIC (Community Interest Company) who run the Information and Gift shop in town, town toilets, Thursday market set up a zoom meeting for members of the Kirkby Lonsdale community, chaired by Sarah Ross.

The following information was shared:

Traffic measures – the Highways Department has reduced the speed limit on Main Street to 20 miles per hour and suspended parking. This is for an initial 21-day period to allow people to step off the pavement to avoid other people queueing. Loading bays can still be used to allow people to collect goods and also delivery vans to drop goods. Nick Cotton said he would take concerns and recommendations from the town back to the County Council.



Shops reopening – the process of opening up the high street seems to be naturally staggered, with different businesses needing different amounts of time to organise themselves and make their premises safe, although some will open Monday 15th June as per govt guidelines. Plans from those present (Abrahams, The Bath House and Borders) included limiting the amount of customers in the shop at any one time, limiting stock on display to avoid customers touching it, not allowing people to buy goods from the shelves, introducing an appointment system for part of the day, and marking out the direction of travel.

Hotel plans – two hotels (The Royal Hotel and The Sun Inn) fed back their plans which include removing touchpoints, stripping out bedrooms, reducing table numbers, introducing an online booking system, writing table plans and risk assessments, and limiting staff until trade can be confirmed.

Visitor Centre support – Janet Nuttall reported that the Visitor Centre is expecting a summer of day trippers and UK-based tourism, with bookings for holiday cottages and self-catering expected to be up.

The visitor numbers and behaviour at Devil's Bridge in recent weekends was discussed and it was suggested that Kirkby will need to absorb a different type of visitor with reduced facilities for the short term. The Visitor Information Centre will reopen on 6th July, operating five days a week

Charter Market – the market will reopen on 18th June with a different layout to allow for 2-metre social distancing and with a reduced number of stallholders. The town has asked the council to consider stopping cars from parking around the perimeter of Market Square on Market Day to make the space safer for pedestrians to move around in a socially distanced way.

Community Hub – officially thanked Boots, Booths and Borders for their help during the lockdown, and reported a team of 100 volunteers had serviced 500 requests. Peter Gregson requested that locals continue to be mindful of the vulnerable and those who can't get out going forward as well as the volunteers. Sue Stoddard from the Fairbank Society reported on how the residents were coping.

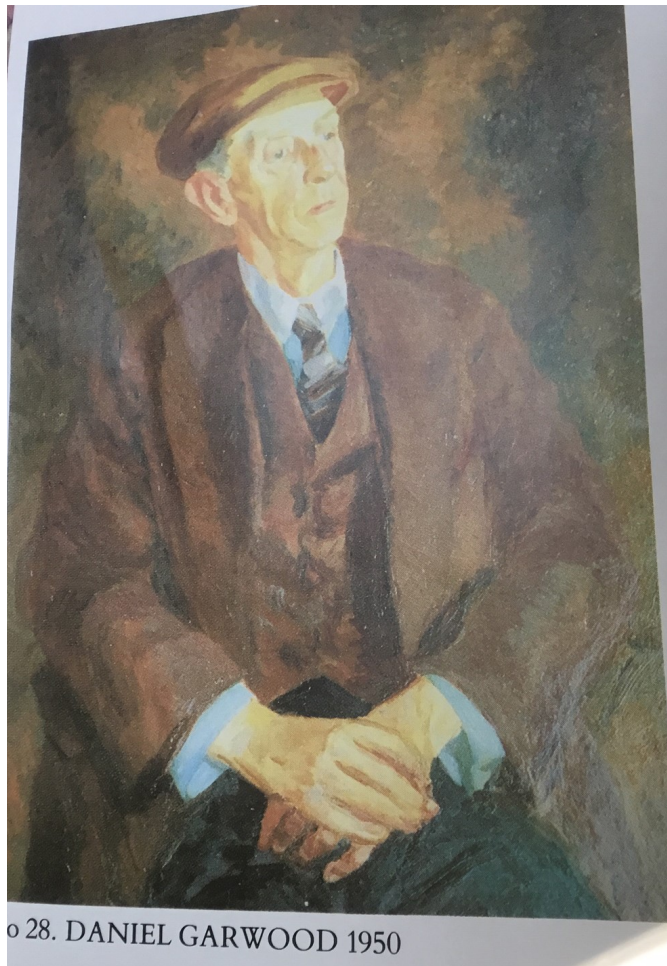
Sports and the Community Cupboard – Kim Bradshaw said golf and tennis are back with hockey also on the horizon, with all games outside. QES was thanked for providing the sports hall for the Community Cupboard until August, when it will find a new home. Janet Bradshaw reported back on the success of the community cupboard.

Church news – Rev'd Richard Snow reported that while St Mary's Church building closed for the lockdown, the church has continued. Plans are afoot to re-open the churches for private prayer (see page 5). The ministry team is also working on plans for funerals and small weddings to be held in church. Funerals are currently held at the graveside or crematorium. On the pastoral side the church team have been helping counsel people and Rev'd Wendy Thornton warned of the need to be aware of community mental health going forward.

National Park response – Julie Barker reported on the situation from the Yorkshire Dales National Park. She said Kirkby is one of many honeypot spots facing similar problems at the moment, with lots of new visitors, people gravitating to water, and issues with litter and fire risks from BBQs. The National Park has created leaflets for two popular destinations with social distancing infographics.

Town Council – Geoff Buswell reported that posters have been printed and will put up suggesting advised behaviour in the town. Mike Birchnall praised the community on how it has reacted to the crisis. He asked for town members to build on what has been achieved and work together going forward, with a town wide approach to any situation.

Chamber of Trade – Robin Sadler said the Chamber of Trade has provided members with a starter pack of PPE including gloves, masks and sanitisers.

It is with great sadness that we have to advise of the sad death of Christine Churchward. Christine and Michael lived in Kirkby Lonsdale, from 1996 until 2011, when they moved to Tiverton in Devon to be near their daughters, Sarah and Rachel.

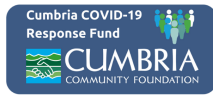

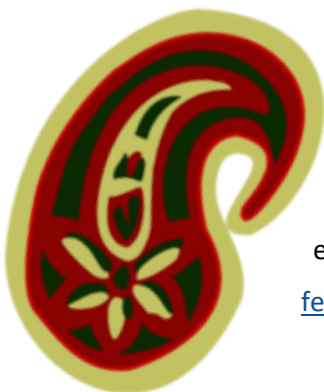
Online Singing

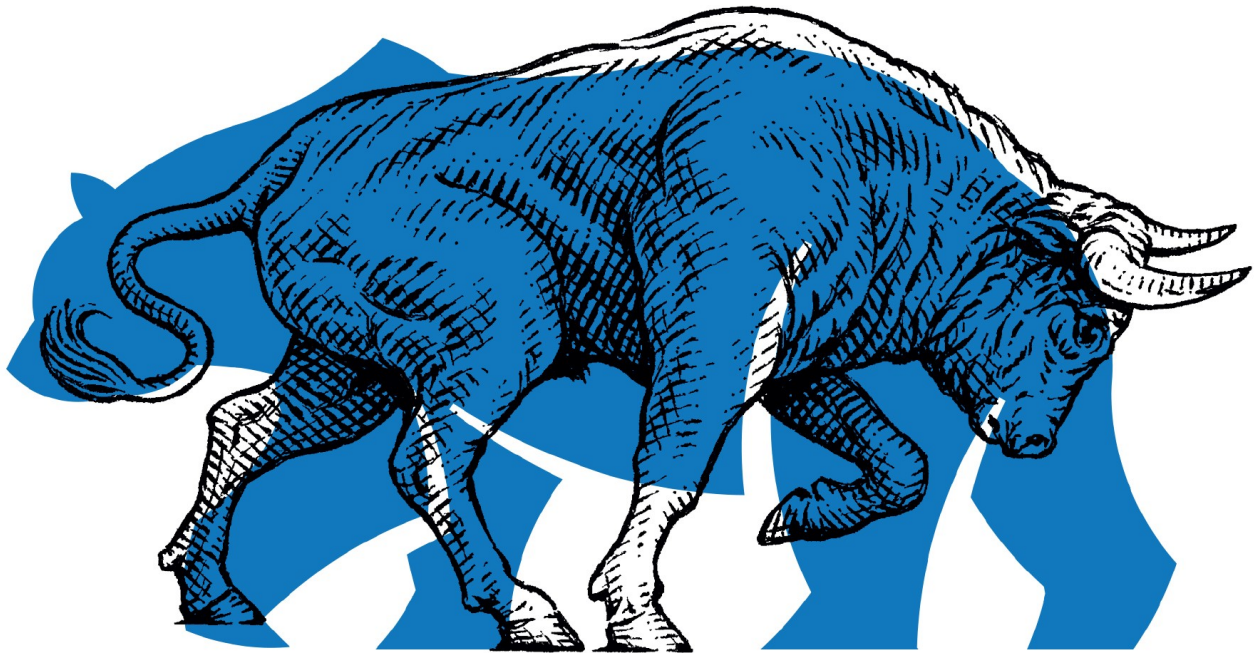
