

The song is called 'The Rainbow Connection' and it is all about having faith and hope that there is something better over the horizon. A rainbow is a good way of expressing hope because it promises that the storm will finish and brighter times will come. The situation that we are currently living through has a rainbow connection since people have been putting rainbow pictures in their windows as a way of expressing thanks to the NHS and, I am sure, hoping for brighter times.

Outside of songs, the most famous rainbow is probably the one associated with Noah and the flood. The story of the flood begins when things look pretty dark. 'The Lord saw that the wickedness of humankind was great in the earth, and that every inclination of the thoughts of their hearts was only evil continually'. This leads to the building of the Ark to rescue Noah, his family and the animals, and then 40 days of rain, followed by another 150 days of lockdown. Finally the waters subside, the land dries and everyone can leave the Ark. Then God blesses Noah and his family and says to them, 'Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth' and promises that 'never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth.' What starts when things looked pretty dark, ends with a rainbow and the promise of a brighter future.

There are ancient flood stories in a number of cultures and they have a number of similarities. But the person who crafted the version we read in Genesis saw in the flood a window into God's character and God's purpose for the whole of creation. God's plan is not for darkness and destruction but that life may flourish.

One of my favourite prayers has a strong rainbow connection and it is a good prayer for the present ...

Heavenly Father,

you have not made us for darkness and death, but for life with you for ever.

Without you we have nothing to hope for; with you we have nothing to fear.

Speak to us now your words of eternal life.

Lift us from anxiety and grief

to the light and peace of your presence,

and set the glory of your love before us;

through Jesus Christ our Lord.

## **Community Hub update**

A BIG thank you to everyone who has volunteered to help with the Hub, and to those people who have rung the Hub requesting assistance with shopping, picking up prescriptions, walking dogs etc. We're pleased that together we've been able to meet needs in our community at a time when so many people have been unable to leave their homes. The number of volunteers, now over 100, has demonstrated the strength of the community we're lucky enough to live in.

Since the Hub helpline opened at the end of March, we have responded to over 400 telephone requests from Kirkby Lonsdale and the surrounding areas and we're working in close partnership with many of the local businesses and organisations such as Booths, the Surgery, Boots, Borders, Dales Butchers, the Lunesdale Bakery, the Spar Shop and the Town Council, who quickly provided a grant to set the Hub up quickly.



Please do get in touch if we can help with shopping, picking up prescriptions etc. If you are feeling fed up and you would like to chat to someone on a regular basis call the Hub and we can connect you with one of our 'Telephone Buddies'.

In addition to the volunteers in the town, we have a further 8 volunteers who man the phone on a rota basis and they direct incoming requests from residents to locally based volunteers who can help.

The Hub is working in partnership to support the new Community Cupboard as it seeks to respond to the growing need for assistance with food and essential items.

## The Church in and around Kirkby Lonsdale

Eleven churches comprising Anglican, Methodist and Roman Catholic congregations, committed to growing as disciples and serving our communities together.

'It's Church, Jim, but not as we know it.'\*

Normally AKL publishes the times and locations of the church services that will take place during the month. Although church buildings had to close at the end of March, services have been continuing. Things were only just getting going in April so it wasn't possible to publicise any details but now we can.

The different churches in and around Kirkby Lonsdale have a long history of working closely together and this has continued during the current crisis. Two new things have been created ....

The first is a website 'kl.church' - http://kl.church. This gives details the services and activities that are taking place and this includes a number of regular activities.

The second is a Youtube channel – kl.church - where we are put our pre-recorded services and other events which can be viewed for some time afterwards.

Our regular services and activities are as follows:

**Sunday 10:30 am** – a morning service from the clergy team followed by coffee. The service is recorded a few days before and 'premieres' on our Youtube channel 'kl.church' at 10:30 am. This is followed by 'virtual' coffee on Zoom. The Zoom details are on the website.

**Sunday 8:00 pm** - Informal worship for younger people on Zoom (all welcome). Details on kl.church

**Wednesdays 10.30** am – Virtual coffee morning on Zoom. The website gives details of how to access these – please join in, virtual coffee mornings are surprisingly good fun!

**Friday 7:30 pm** - Compline (night prayer) on Friday evenings using Zoom. Further details including the order of service are on the website.

Messy Church – the next is scheduled for 19th July. Weekdays 8:15 am – Morning Prayer with the clergy

It is early days and we are still getting used to the technology, and 'it's church, but not as we know it'. Apparently Spock never actually said, 'It's life, Jim, but not as we know it'.



'My income has dropped due to coronavirus and I'm struggling to keep up with all of my bills. I rent my house from a

private landlord and pay all the usual bills - electricity, water, and Council Tax. How best can I juggle them, and is there any help I can get from the government? '

If your income is reduced because of coronavirus, you should check whether you're entitled to sick pay or benefits. You can check your eligibility for both sick pay and benefits on the Citizens Advice website. If you're already on existing benefits, these might also increase.

If you're struggling to pay rent, talk to your landlord straight away. You should explain the situation and could ask for more time to pay, a temporary reduction in rent, or ask to catch up any missed payments by instalments. If you contact South Lakes Citizens Advice an adviser can help you explain things to your landlord. If you can't come to an agreement with your landlord, it's a good idea to pay what you can afford and keep a record of what you offered. The government passed an emergency law which means landlords have to give you three months' notice to end certain tenancy types from 26 March. The court service has suspended all possession

action for 90 days from 27 March. This means that even if you have been served a notice for eviction it's unlikely it can be enforced during this time.

If you already claim Housing Benefit, you should tell the council your income has reduced. If you don't claim it already, you might be entitled to help with housing costs from the government. When it comes to your utilities, you should contact the provider as soon as possible. Depending on the type of bill, they may be able to arrange a payment plan, or they may have schemes in place for people in financial hardship. You should also talk to your local council - as your income has changed you might be entitled to a council tax reduction. If you're struggling to pay multiple bills, it's important to prioritise energy bills and council tax over credit card bills. This is because the immediate consequences of not paying these things are much more serious. South Lakes Citizens Advice can help you with this.

## **Kirkby Lonsdale Rugby Club**

Mini and Youth section keep training... isolation style During 'normal' times, if you visit KLRUFC on Sunday mornings Sep-May, you will see hundreds of boys and girls aged 5-17, training or playing rugby. The players and their families descend on the ground with a primary objective; to have fun. In all the Club runs 13 age grade squads from the micros up to U16s, teams for both boys and girls. Our numbers mean that, with visiting teams, you can see 500-750 players in action on any given Sunday.

None of this would be possible if it wasn't for our 'pioneers' who started our mini and youth section in 1987. Jane Harrison (formerly Wilman) was undoubtedly one of the main reasons we can now boast one of the biggest mini and youth sections in the North of England. Having started with just 10 players, with her husband John and working with North Ribblesdale Rugby Club, Jane stayed involved with our mini and youth section as our numbers grew and our standalone mini and youth section was formed. Within 10 years it had grown from 10 to 200 players, from 2 parent/coaches to 17, with many others helping prepare and serve food, organise fixtures etc.

Having introduced hundreds of kids to rugby (and parents to volunteering at the club), Jane hung up her boots 6 years ago but can often be found at the club at the weekend during the season. On Sunday to see our current army of volunteers (30 coaches, 15 Team managers and a whole host of other helpers) and our players in action. Or on a Saturday to see former minis now playing for our senior sides. Kirkby Lonsdale Rugby Club and the town is one of the favourite places to visit for any of our visiting teams, whether they come for the day or for the weekend. Whilst we always encourage our visitors to spend some time (and some money) in the town, one visit and they are hooked and looking forward to coming back!

Over the years our club has continued to flourish thanks to all those who have got involved, too many to name individually! We look forward to welcoming teams back to Kirkby Lonsdale soon. In the meantime, our players of all ages are keeping up their training, in isolation and with their families. If you have access to Facebook and visit our page (Kirkby Lonsdale Rugby Union Football Club or via the link on our website www.klrufc.co.uk) you will be able to see some video action, as well as other videos, posts and pictures of all our teams, of what they have all be up to whilst the club is closed.

It goes without saying, when we are back, you are welcome to come and see our fantastic children in

action (Bacon buns & refreshments available from the clubhouse!) and/or, if you are under 16, you are welcome to join in and try rugby yourself! In the meantime keep safe and well.

There have been one or two suggestion where these stones find a permanent home but I propose we have a 'Roll of Honour' type list of all the youngsters that in this time of national crisis did something positive for our town.

Social media is a very good way of relaying urgent information like road closures due to accident or a tree down and for passing on information connected with the current crisis but could I ask that if you have a concern directly relating to Kirkby Lonsdale that you email or phone a town councillor – these details are on the town website. Issues like dog fouling are the responsibility of SLDC, parking, CCC or SLDC. It is not a case of trying to pass the buck but getting the problem directed to where it can be dealt with.

The Community Cupboard – what a great idea! Thank you to the organisers and an even bigger thank you to people that keep it stocked, it's a credit to our town. The one in the church porch was full to the brim when I visited – a second box perhaps?? The 100 club winning numbers are 48, 10 and 72 congratulations to the winners.

Finally, thanks to all the volunteers, shops and staff, banks and post office, Diane for getting the AKL out and all my fellow councillors.

# The Consequences of Failing to Stop

As I type a team of volunteers and I are working to try and create a Messy Church online. Messy Church, for those who have not heard of it, is a place where people of all ages gather to explore and learn through interaction, storytelling and various activities about the Christian faith. It is family friendly and centres around the idea that Church is fun and is for everyone! I have been part of helping to shape Messy Church in Kirkby Lonsdale since December 2019. It is still a new venture but the people who have attended seemed to have enjoyed themselves and the wonderful food. It felt important, during this time of unrest, to try and create Messy Church online, albeit without the yummy food.

Online we are exploring the story of the Good Samaritan. A story that will be familiar to many, but I think is very relevant for today. It always struck me with horror as a child, that someone could walk past someone injured and not think to help. In fact, not one but two people did, one of whom was a Priest. As an adult I have begun to understand that fear plays a part for some who passed by. That fear may well have been one of losing their reputation or they may have worried that in some way touching the Samaritan may have made them unclean. The latter concept may seem odd at first, but I wonder if it is something we understand more in this time of lockdown. A time where the thought of accidentally brushing against someone not in our household may cause tension or anxiety to increase. It may well cause fear.

I have come to see this story as one that shows a message of what the extremes of fear can do to us. It can bring out parts of ourselves we would rather ignore or forget. The Samaritan who does stop to help the

injured man looked beyond cultural differences and fears of being contaminated in any way. Instead he focused on the innate human and God led reaction to see another being in pain and want to help.

In the book of Romans in the Bible, Paul talks of the idea that everyone has an innate sense of right from wrong, something that he describes as God's written law in your heart. This informs our own consciences with thoughts that tell us deep down right from wrong. I love this idea and I think it links to the idiom of a 'prick of conscience' where one feels guilty or perhaps shame for something they have thought, said, done or not done. All of us have experienced this prick of conscience, this feeling of knowing there is or was a better way. I wonder how the Priest and the other traveller felt in the days after their journey. Did they think of what they did or did not do? Did they wonder about the man they left lying hurt in the road? Did they feel that prick of conscience?

Often, we focus on the Samaritan in the story whom we can see did the right thing. He helped someone else without thinking of himself. I hope in this time of Covid-19 we can all learn to do this no matter how strong our fear is. It is tricky and tough, and I for one have fallen into the place of fear at times; I have been the other less helpful travellers on that road. Yet, as I think about those that passed by in this story I wonder if the weight of not stopping and not listening to an inner sense of right and wrong, written in their hearts, was greater still than conquering their fear and stopping to help. The traveller who stopped became the loving presence of God in that moment; caring, welcoming and supportive of the other, the broken, the ignored, the different traveller. It is something I know I will continue to strive to be in this topsy turvy world.

The Community Cupboard is for everyone who is struggling to provide for themselves and their families during these difficult times. It is supported by the Kirkby Lonsdale Community Hub, Cumbria County Council, Kirkby Lonsdale Town Council, Churches in Lunesdale, the GP Surgery and care providers, local schools and businesses.

A group of volunteers have come together to respond quickly to what, we understand, is becoming a more urgent need in our area. The true level of need in our area is yet unknown, but we know there are many people struggling to make ends meet, including people who may never have needed help before. Replicating initiatives that are popping up across the country, The Community Cupboard has been set up for those in Kirkby Lonsdale and surrounding communities. Until a similar provision is established in Sedbergh, we will also be providing support to families in Sedbergh and its surrounding areas.

The Community Cupboard enables our community to support each other, as summed up in our motto "Bring what you can, take what you need". Our mission is to alleviate food poverty, period poverty and reduce food waste. Our values are to be respectful of all, maintaining confidentiality and dignity at all times.

This website will be developed further; we know we may need to make changes as we move forward but for now, we hope it provides the urgent information that is needed. How do I get help?

Please register by filling out a form available at https://klcommunity.co.uk/. Alternatively, call The Hub on 015242 36404 (open daily from 10:00-16:00) and they will register you over the phone.

Please be reassured that confidentiality will be respected, and deliveries made anonymously. An individual shopping order number will be applied to your request, this will then be on your shopping bag when collected/delivered no personal information is available to packers and deliverers.

## Where is the Community Cupboard?

The Community Cupboard is currently located in the Lunesdale Sports Centre, off Kendal Road at the back of Queen Elizabeth School astroturf pitch and next to the new Oakfield Estate. Parking available outside.

Can I come straight to the Lunesdale Hall to collect provisions?

We are only able to man the Community Cupboard at certain times, to ensure the safety of all, so it is necessary to register first so we can arrange what is the best way for your to receive the provisions. We can arrange discrete collection from the Lunesdale Sports Hall, or delivery to your door.

## How can I donate?

We currently have collection boxes at Spar, Boots the Chemist, Cowan Bridge Stores, The Churchmouse at Barbon and in St Mary's church porch. Our volunteers will be collecting these boxes on a regular basis. If you work somewhere that would be happy to house a collection box please get in touch as we would like to spread collection points as widely as possible. No collections will be wasted as excess goods will be passed on to neighbouring pop up pantries and food banks. If you would like to make a financial donation please enquire through website or email enquiry@klcommunity.co.uk.

We respectfully ask that you do not leave donations outside the Lunesdale Sports Hall, except at specified / pre-arranged drop-off times when you can leave donations inside. We are not able to use any food donations that have been left unattended outside for an unknown length of time.

## What can I donate?

Tinned Foods: baked beans, tomatoes, fish, vegetables, kidney beans, butter beans, soup, fruit, custard, rice pudding.


