Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven



Around 1516, the artist Raphael was commissioned to produce a painting of the incident known as the Transfiguration. This is the occasion when Jesus took three disciples with him to the top of a mountain. Transfiguration means something being made more beautiful or glorious.

It is the name given to this incident because afterwards those disciples said that they had seen the glory of God visible in Jesus.

Instead of just painting the incident on top of the mountain, Raphael also chose to paint what was happening with the other disciples at the same time. So, the painting is in two halves. The upper half is the mountain top with the figure of Christ, his arms raised in blessing, dressed in white and bathed in light. The lower half shows a much darker scene; the background is almost black. The disciples are on the left of the painting and on the right there is a boy in the throes of convulsions with his parents holding him.

In the middle of the lower scene is a woman with her back to the viewer. She is looking at the disciples but pointing to the boy as if to say 'can't you do something to help?'

Each year, just before the start of Lent, the story of the transfiguration is read in church. Then the journey through the 40 days of Lent begins. Lent invites us to take an honest look at ourselves, and the world of which we are part. It coincides with spring and so it is an opportunity to pay attention to its beauty and the signs of new life but also to recognise that there are things that disfigure it; things that need to be transfigured.

There is a tendency to think that Lent is all about giving things up for 40 days. A better way is to commit ourselves to actions that will transfigure the part of the world where God has placed us, and perhaps find ourselves transfigured in the process.

I think Raphael's painting is very clever. By putting the

two scenes together it suggests that the mountain top and what is happening below are related. We know that life can never be one endless 'mountain top' experience but the painting is full of hope. The light from the mountain top is radiating into the darkness and changing the world below. There is hope that a disfigured world can be transfigured. Perhaps it is a picture of the part of the Lord's prayer that says 'thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven'.

Raphael died prematurely in 1520 and this was his last painting. At the time of his death it wasn't quite finished but when his body was laid out, this painting was placed at his head.

The gift of individuality

St. Patrick's Youth Group adult leaders have been encouraging their charges to have a go at leading. The Youth Group, which meets at Endmoor Village Hall every Tuesday during term-time, has five sections. We begin with a welcome, followed by games, a workshop, reflection time and finally food. Currently, we have a core group of seven young people aged 9-13 years old who attend five different schools, all bringing different gifts and qualities to the group. Despite their differences they are joined in their desire to encourage and support one another. I learn a lot from watching the dynamics between this diverse group.

I enjoy popping in every month, to see the changes, as the group becomes tighter and friendships are cemented. On my visit in February I could see a change in confidence as the leaders had encouraged ownership of different sections of group. One young person ably led our welcome and encouraged their peers to honestly say how their week had been. Some brought worries or concerns that they aired in what felt like a safe space for them. They were listened to and when appropriate advice was offered by fellow peers and the leaders; time was given to this act of listening and sharing. It felt essential, some might call sacred.

The night I joined them, I had arrived ready to lead a game but instead asked if anyone else would like to lead. An individual who is normally more hesitant offered. I asked if they wanted me to play the game too or help in leading. It was with pride I heard the response: 'You play, I can lead it...' They were confident and clear with their instructions. The young people were eager to help.

I think all of us can learn from a group like this. Everyone can be themselves. Individuality is totally encouraged but respect for everyone is required. Patience has grown in this group as they have learnt the importance of listening and truly hearing what each member is trying to say. Too often in the world we have become keener to correct or rebut, rather than listen to try and hear what a person means. It means wires can be crossed easily if we focus too much on how something is said rather than on the meaning.

This group of young people, with their different backgrounds, is used to having to listen closely to one another. They are keen to give each other time and are at ease with one another to ask questions either to clarify a point or gently question a thought or perspective. I hope all of us can adopt this more gentle and easy forgiving tone when listening to each other.

The Lunesdale Hall

A bright future. As many readers will be aware, the Lunesdale Hall Management Committee has been looking at how the Hall, a major community asset, can better meet the needs of the Town and its residents. The Hall is well used but is somewhat dated, though many people appreciate its character and charm. We want the Hall to be an accessible and welcoming community hub, open for all to enjoy, and not depending solely on bookings.

A Feasibility Study explored its future and identified considerable potential for further use. One key proposal was to transfer the library from its current location to the Hall. However, whilst the costs and risks associated with this were considered too great and this option will not now be pursued, many of the improvements identified by the Study are to be taken forward by the Committee—the begging bowl will be out!

The Hall is becoming popular as a wedding reception venue and the Committee are keen to attract more weddings, concerts, exhibitions etc to the Hall. To bring the Hall up to modern standards a new sound and projection system is now in place; the main Hall, the Bective Room and Kitchen have been decorated; new stage curtains have been installed; and a new lighting system will be in place over the next few months. In addition, much needed external works are soon to be carried out.

Running a successful facility such as the Lunesdale Hall is no mean task and the Committee will be working with users and local residents to ensure that the Hall 'offer' meets local needs. In particular, the first floor requires improvement to provide better accommodation for health care and other uses; and marketing and management of the Hall will be priorities.

We hope that the Town will continue to support the use and development of the Lunesdale Hall and we will keep you updated as our improvement plan proceeds. Contact us at: Lunesdalehallbookings@gmail.com

The next talk of the Winter Series is on Monday 9 March in the Lunesdale Hall at 7.30pm.This talk is preceded by the AGM and followed by wine and nibbles.

Gleaston Water Mill – the restoration Story by Vicky and Mike Bereton, 'a historical jigsaw'. A water corn mill has existed on the present site of Gleaston Water Mill for at least 600 years. Originally called Hart Mill it belonged to the Lords of the Manor of Muchland whose seat was the now ruined Gleaston Castle. In 1987 the mill was purchased by Mike and Vicky Brereton and their talk will focus on how over the past 30 years they have pieced together some of the mill's history through documentation, archaeological digs, comparisons with other mills, visits from experts, photographs and logical deduction.

Even more ancient than Gleaston is Calacum. But where is it? Last month, Bill Shannon gave us a superbly illustrated talk on how the very first map of Roman Britain was created in the 16th century by Abraham Ortelius. An eminent cartographer in Antwerp, Ortelius employed sources including a fourth-century list of important Roman places with their latitudes and longitudes, Roman 'itineraries' and correspondents on the ground to create the map, published in 1590. He and subsequent cartographers always had the fort at Calacum in the northwest, but it gradually moved from the Eden valley to Over Burrow, where it still is. Nothing can be seen above ground, but http://www.romanroads.org/gazetter/M705.htm has an excellent 'LIDAR' image.

I'm from Austria and I know I need to apply for Settled Status now the UK has left the European Union. But I'm really con-

fused about what documents I need in order to apply for me and my children.

Your rights won't change until 31 December 2020. However, you should apply as soon as you can as after that date you might be asked to prove your right to get a job or use a service like the NHS. You need evidence that you've lived in the UK for 6 months out of every 12 months for 5 years in a row plus a passport or national ID card, a digital photo, your NI number or proof of how long you've lived in the UK, a mobile number and an email address.

If you make your children's application after your own, you can 'link' your child's application to yours, via your application number. If your own application is successful, your child will get the same status as you.
